

Posters allow the dissemination of scholarly work completed by an individual or group, and presented by a single representative (ideally, first author). Posters can describe the results of a research project, a review of programmatic innovation related to clinical care, or a review of literature related to a clinical case (i.e., case report). The topic must be considered relevant and specific to C-L Psychiatry.

The poster session is normally two to three hours in duration. At least one author is required to attend and be present throughout the session to discuss the presentation with attendees.

Posters are graded according to their value in the following areas: clinical applicability, originality, scientific content, and overall quality.

To be considered a Trainee Poster and be eligible for a Trainee Poster Award, a trainee must be a substantial contributor to the work, the first author on the abstract, and the presenter of the poster at the meeting.

Poster boards at the meeting are uniformly 8ft wide x 4ft tall. Posters should be sized accordingly to fit (i.e., may be smaller than poster board size, may not be larger).
